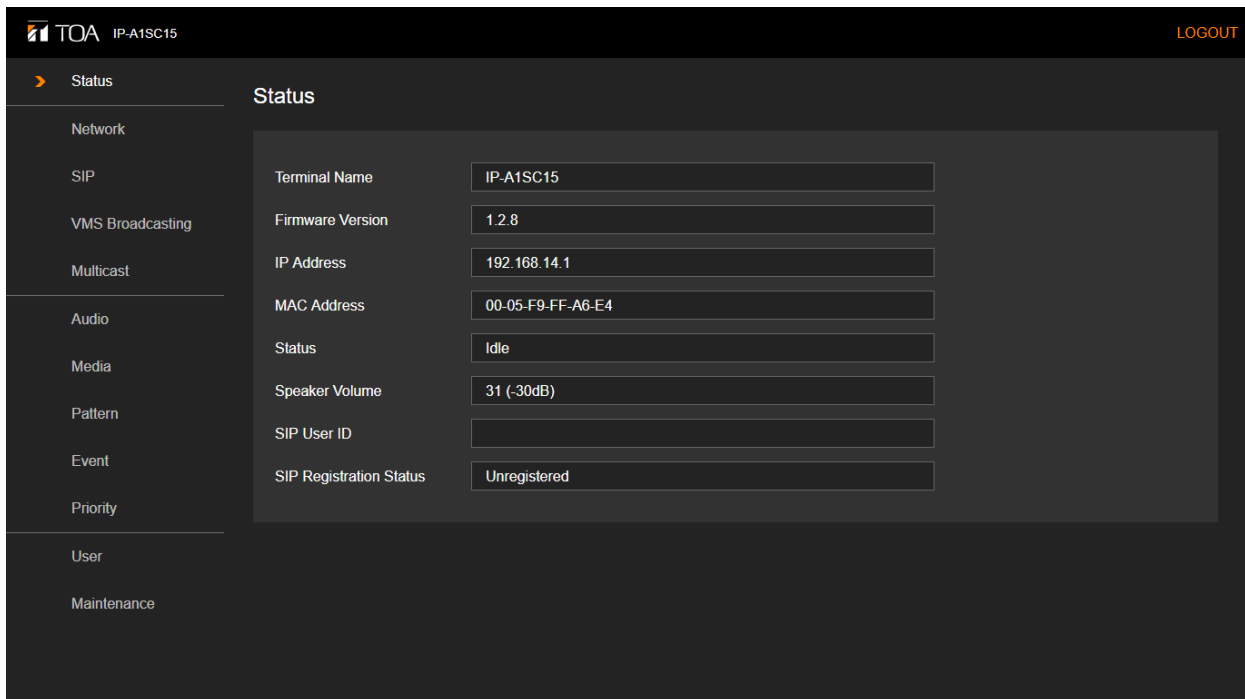

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# 1. SETUP SUMMARY

Connecting a PC to the IP-A1SC15 IP Horn Speaker (hereinafter referred to as the "unit") by way of a browser\* allows the following settings, displays and the like to be made via a network.

# 2. SYSTEM REQUIREMENTS

### 3. CONNECTION

#### 3.1. Connection Presets

The unit is factory-preset as follows:

Username: admin  
Password: guest  
IP address: 192.168.14.1  
Subnet mask: 255.255.255.0  
Default gateway: 192.168.14.254

Before connecting a PC to the IP horn speaker and changing its setting, it will be necessary to set the PC's network settings so that it can operate on the same network as the IP horn speaker. Take care that no IP addresses are duplicated in the same network. For example, if the IP horn speaker's IP address is 192.168.14.1, set the PC's IP address to 192.168.14.10 or the like.

#### 3.2. Making Connection

##### Notes

- Avoid simultaneously connecting to the IP horn speaker from multiple PCs.
- Avoid simultaneously connecting to the IP horn speaker from a single PC using multiple browsers.

**Step 1.** Connect both the unit and the PC to be used for setup to the network.

**Step 2.** Start the PC's browser and enter the unit's IP address in the address field.

Example: 192.168.14.1

The Login screen will be displayed.

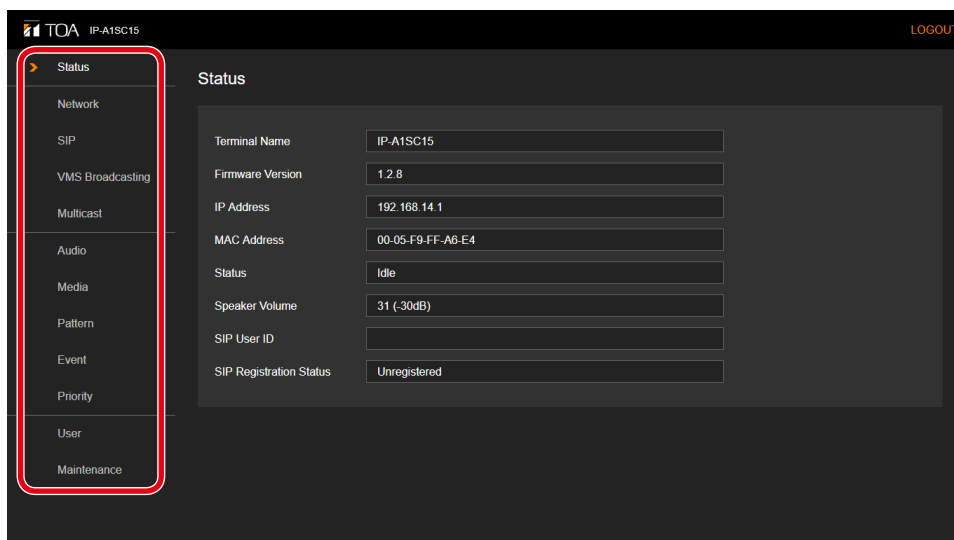
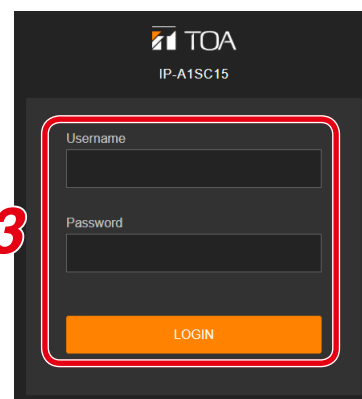
##### Tip

Default IP address: 192.168.14.1

**Step 3.** Enter both the username and the password, and click on the LOGIN button.

The Status screen will be displayed.

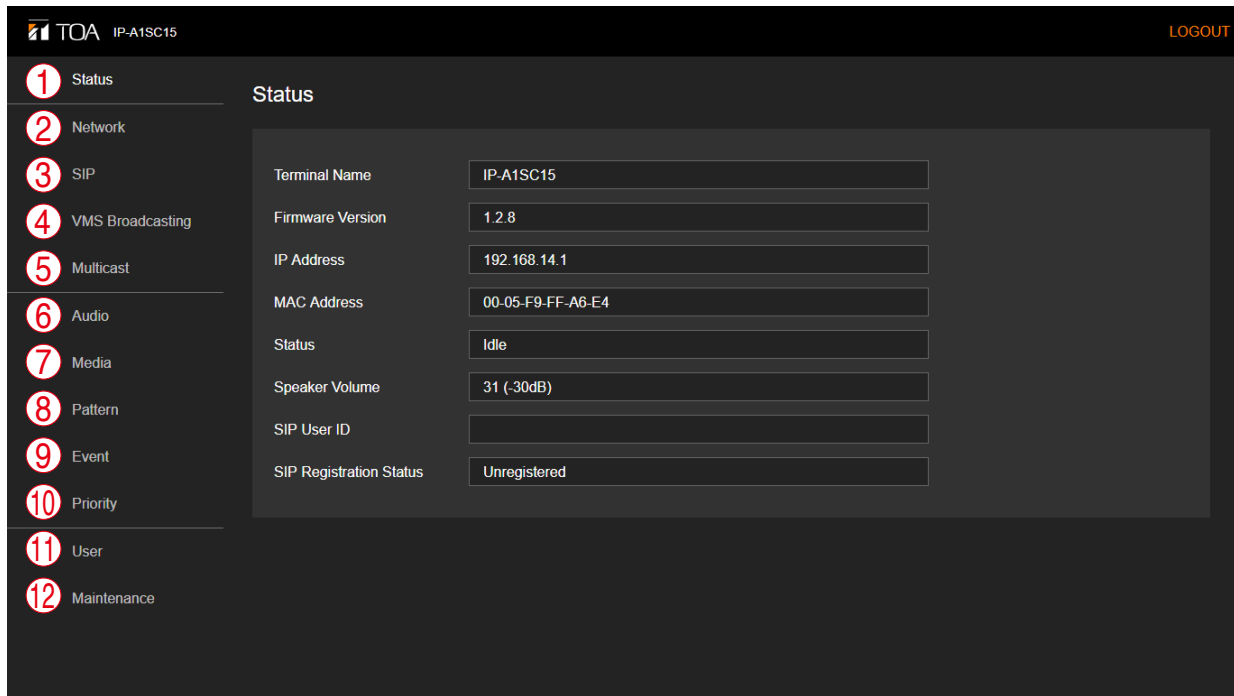
Click on the individual function names arranged on the left side of the browser screen to switch screens and perform the required settings for each selected screen.



## 4. SWITCHING SETUP SCREENS

Click on the individual function names arranged on the left side of the screen to switch screens and perform the required settings for each selected screen.

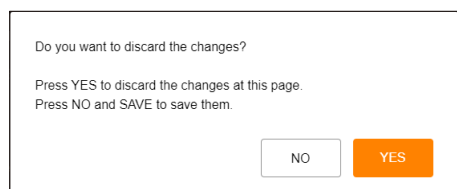

#### Note

Attempting to switch screens without clicking on the SAVE button after changes are made to the settings or contents of each screen (Status screen, Media setting screen and Maintenance screen excepted) will cause the following screen to appear:

- If saving changes made to the setting contents of a screen, first click



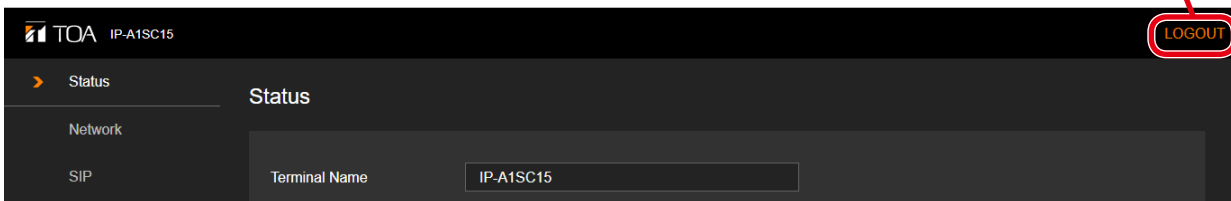
on the NO button, then the SAVE button, before switching screens.

- If not saving changes made to the setting contents, click on the YES button. The display will switch to another screen without saving the contents.

## 4.2. Logging Out

To terminate the network connection after completing confirmation or changes to the unit's settings, click on the LOGOUT button. When logged out, the Login screen will be displayed.

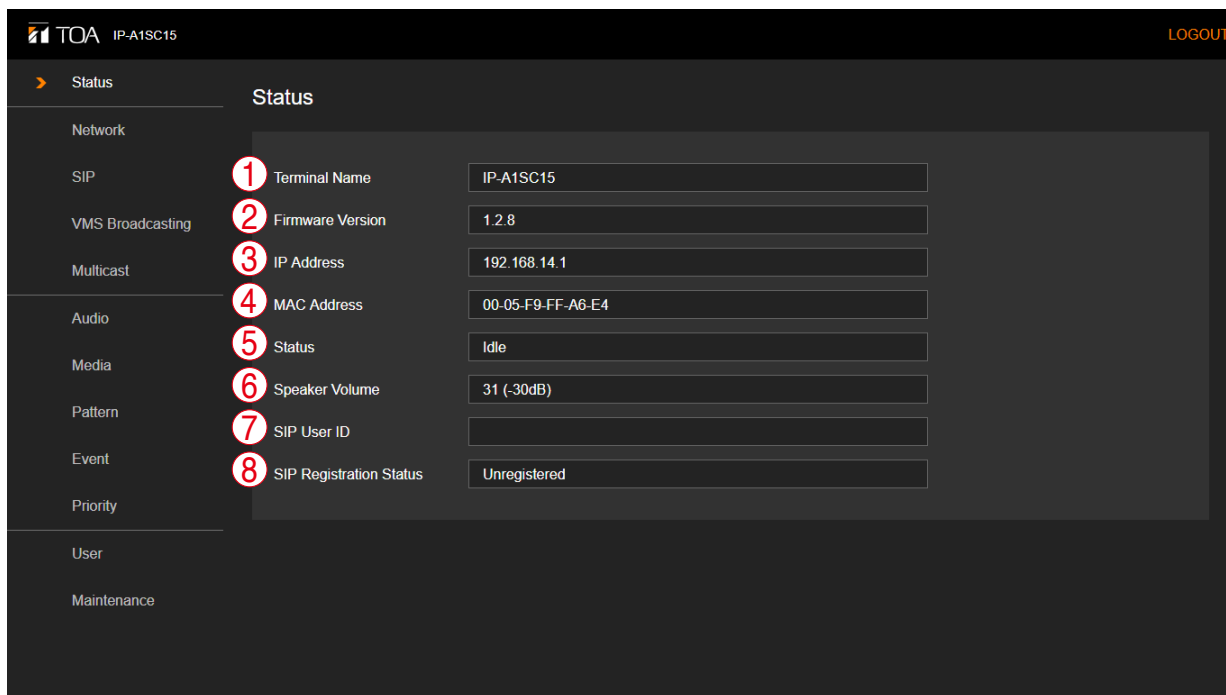

Since this page only displays the current settings, the contents cannot be changed on this page.



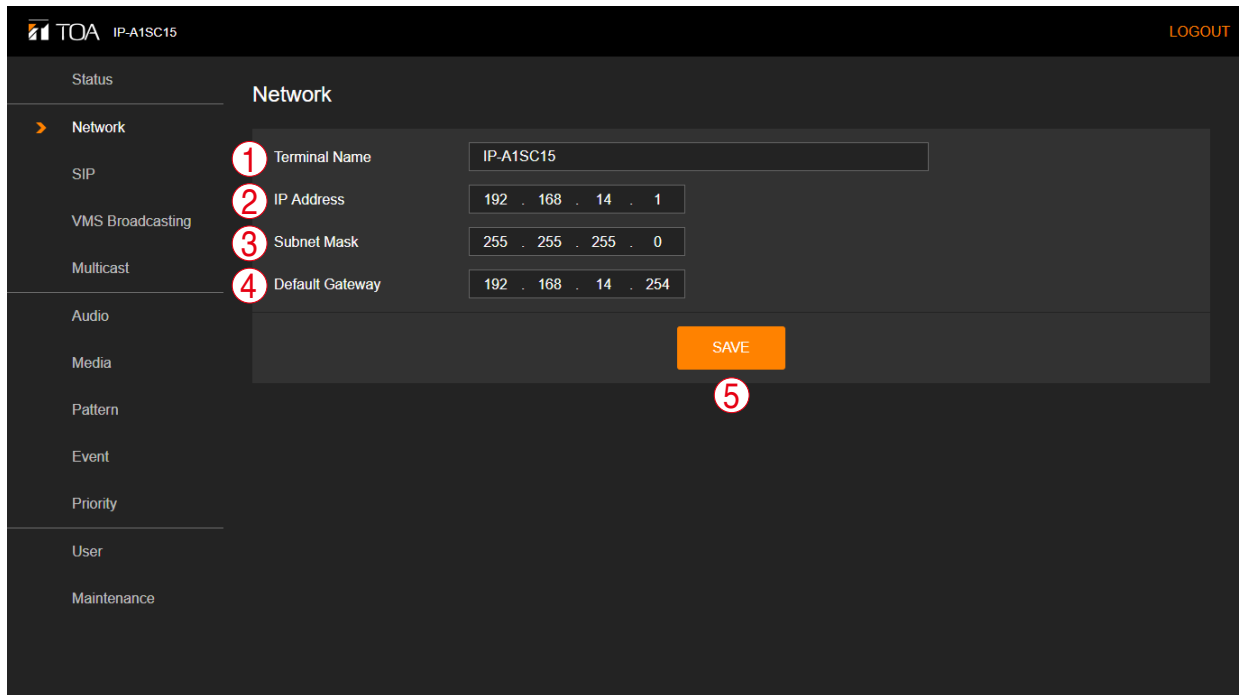

## 7. SIP SETTINGS SCREEN

Perform all settings related to SIP connections.

### 7.1. Display Contents

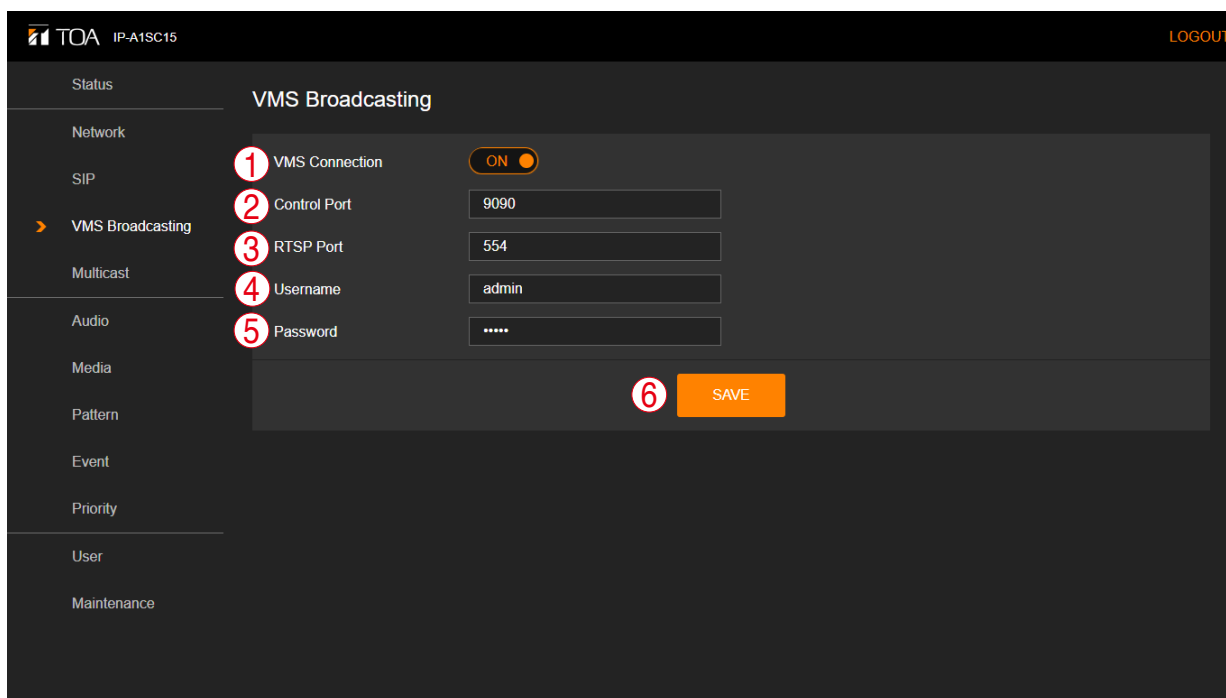

## 8. VMS BROADCASTING SETTINGS SCREEN

Perform all settings related to VMS connections.

### 8.1. Display Contents

#### Note

When performing VMS broadcasting from VMS software in a WAN environment, the VMS software must support RTP/RTSP/TCP (Video/Audio/Audio Backchannel). Please check the manual of the VMS software.

## 8.2. Saving Settings & Changes

When all settings or changes are completed, save their contents.

**Step 1.** Click on the SAVE button.

The dialog box, "Changed contents enabled after restart." is displayed.

**Step 2.** Click on the OK button.

### **Note**

## 9. MULTICAST SETTINGS SCREEN

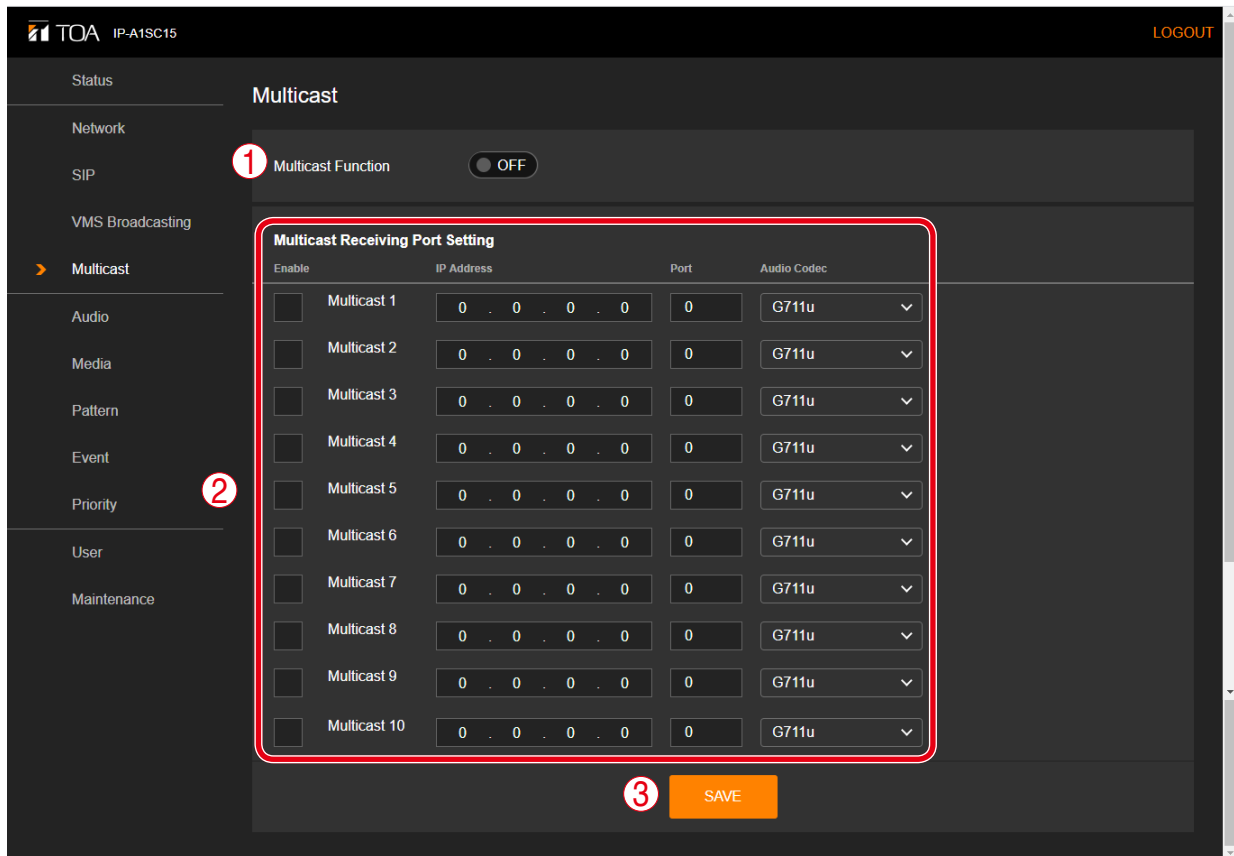
The unit's Multicast-related settings are performed on this screen.

### Note

The unit is incompatible with IGMP.

When a multicast broadcast cannot be executed, even if settings are correct, it may be possible that the switching hub's IGMP snooping function is enabled. In such cases, disable the IGMP snooping function.

### 9.1. Display Contents

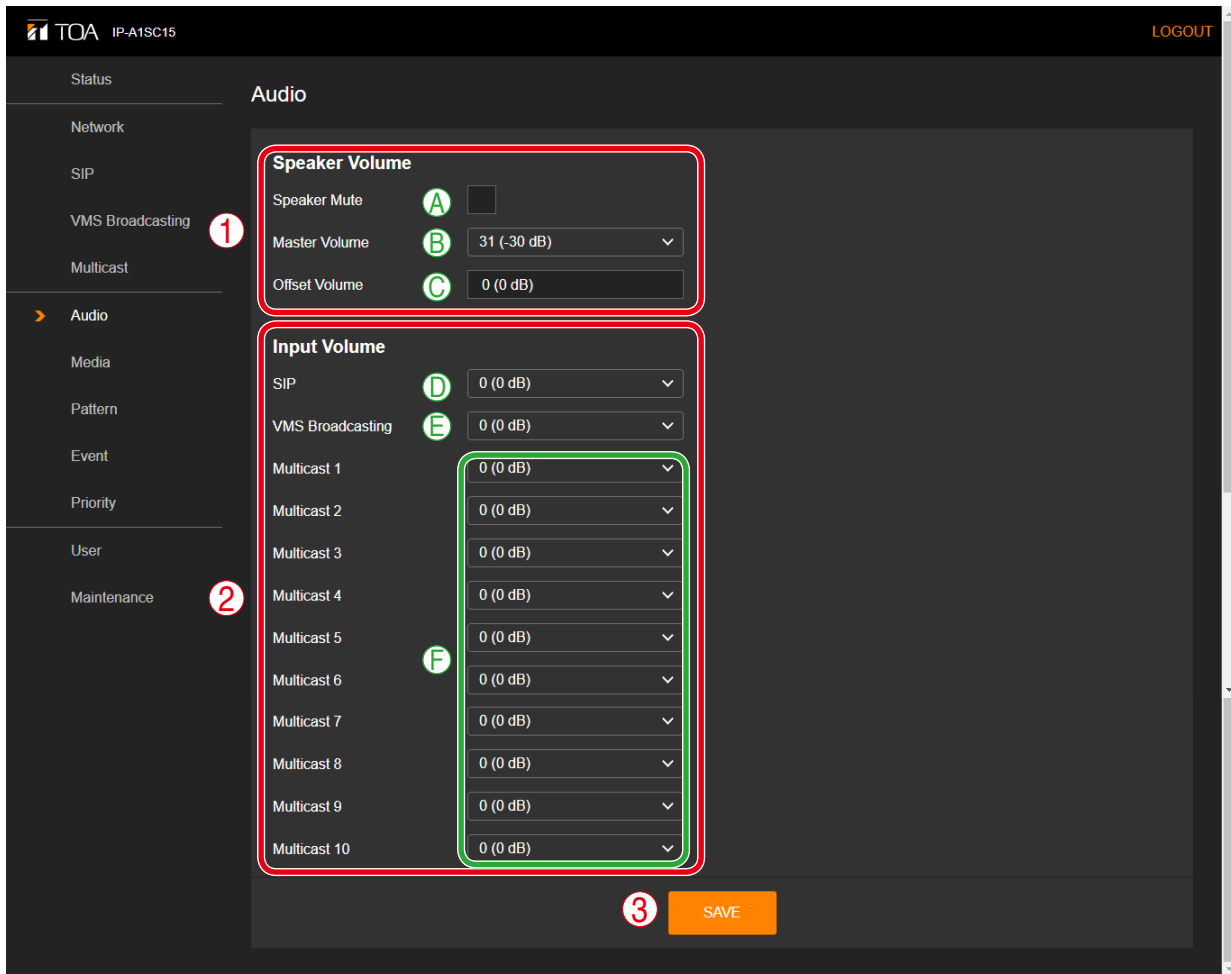

## 10. AUDIO SETTINGS SCREEN

The speaker's master volume and correction volume are set for each broadcast using this screen.

### 10.1. Display Contents



#### (1) Speaker Volume

Adjust the speaker's broadcasting volume.

| B | Master Volume* | Click on the [▽] mark to select the appropriate speaker volume from the pulldown menu.<br>Setting range: 0 (mute) – 61 (0 dB)<br>Initial setting: 31 (-30 dB)   |
| C | Offset Volume* | Displays the set value of offset volume correction to the Master Volume.<br>Offset volume correction is set remotely by external equipment and cannot be adjusted using the browser.<br>Setting range: -20 to +20 dB<br>Initial setting: 0 dB |

\* Actual speaker broadcasting volume is determined by the sum of the Master Volume and Offset Volume settings.

## (2) Input Volume

Set the correction volume for each broadcast.

## 10.2. Saving Settings & Changes

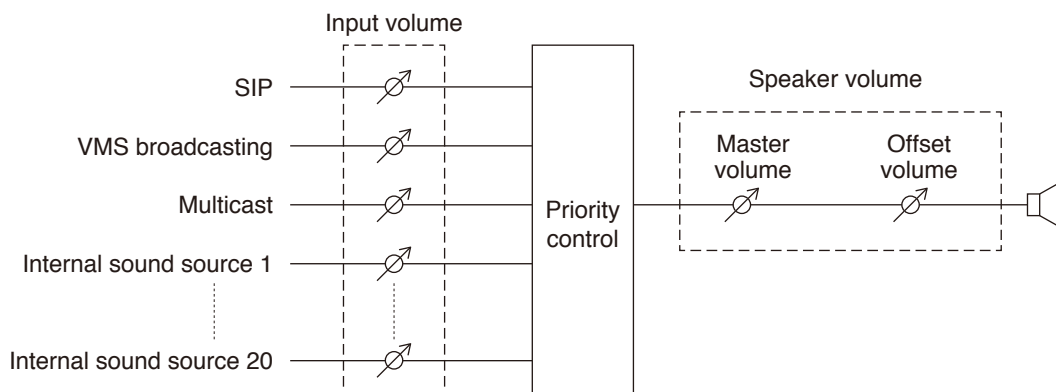
**Step 1.** Click on the SAVE button.  
The dialog box is displayed.

**Step 2.** Click on the OK button.

### Tips

- Changes to the speaker volume settings are enabled immediately after being saved.
- Input volume setting changes are reflected as follows:
  - SIP broadcast: Enabled immediately after changes are saved.
  - VMS broadcast: Enabled with the next broadcast after changes are saved.
  - Multicast broadcast: Enabled 3 – 30 seconds after changes are saved depending on the number of ports changed.

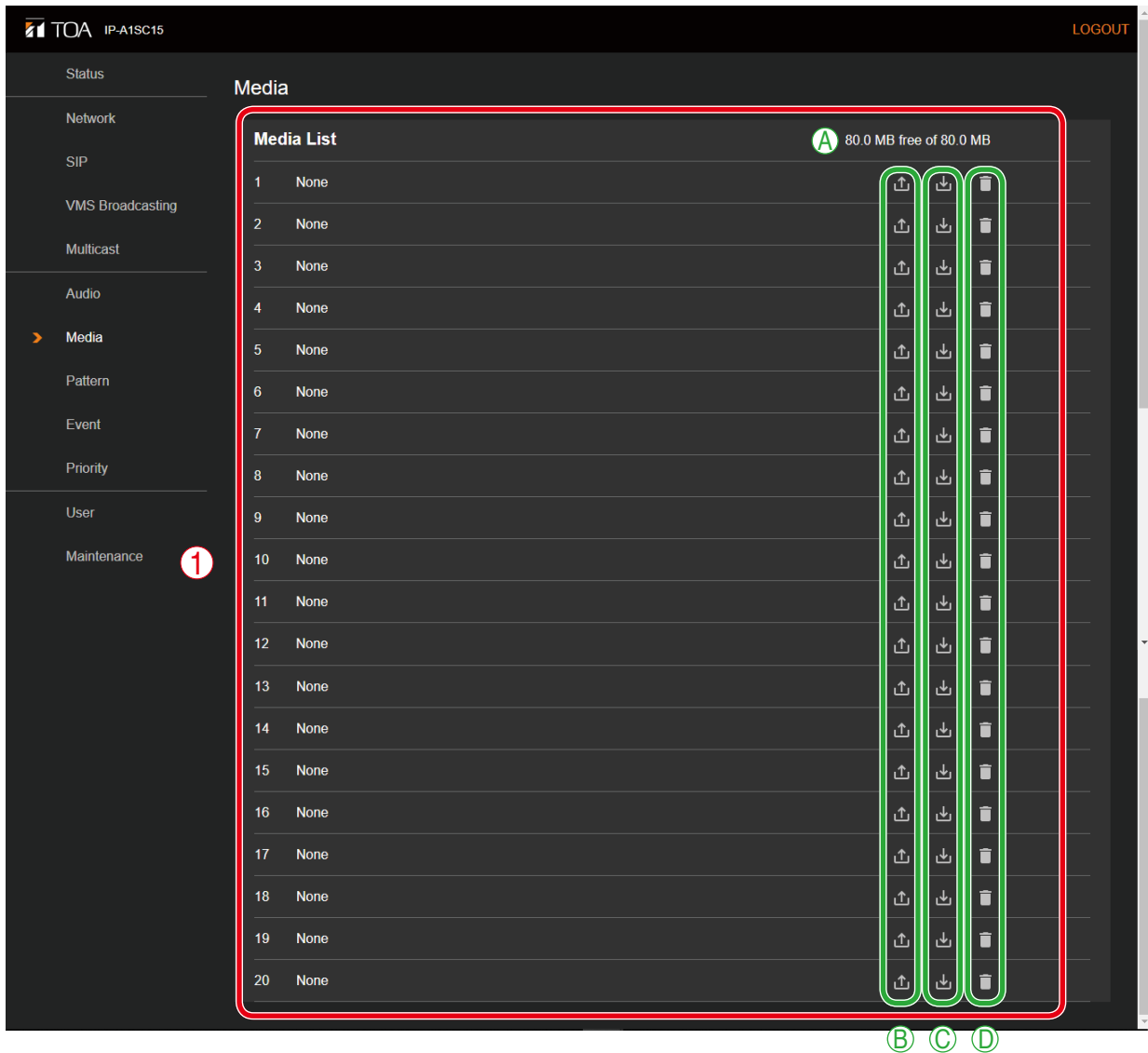
## 10.3. Conceptual Diagram of the Sound Volume Settings Function



# 11. MEDIA SETTING SCREEN

This screen is used to upload, download or delete the internal sound source files.

## 11.1. Display Contents



### (1) Internal Sound Source List (Media List)

This list shows the names of the sound source files currently stored in the unit. Sound source files can be registered to media numbers 1 – 20. Either MP3 or WAV files can be uploaded to the unit.

| A | Available capacity for internal sound source files | Displays max. unit capacity (80 MB) and currently available sound source file upload capacity.  |
| B | Upload Icon  | Uploads PC-saved sound source files to the unit and adds them to the Internal Sound Source list. (See "Uploading Sound Source Files" on p. 20.) |
| C | Download Icon                                      | Downloads sound source files from the unit and saves them to the PC. (See "Downloading Sound Source Files" on p. 20.)                           |
| D | Delete Icon  | Deletes sound source files from the unit. (See "Deleting Sound Source Files" on p. 21.)   |

## 11.2. Uploading Sound Source Files

Follow the procedure below to upload sound source files to the unit:

Max. sound source file storage capacity is 30 MB per file and 80 MB total.

Supported file formats are as follows:

WAV file: 8/16/44.1/48 kHz sampling frequency, 8/16 bit, monaural/stereo

MP3 file: 32/44.1/48 kHz sampling frequency, 64 to 320 kbps, CBR/VBR, monaural/stereo

### Notes


- There are restrictions on the types of characters that can be used for filenames. Files that do not meet these conditions cannot be used. Upload the file after changing the filename to one that consists of only usable characters, referring to "[USABLE CHARACTERS](#)" on p. 48.
- If sound source files are uploaded while an internal sound source broadcast is in progress, the broadcast will stop.

### Tip

Sound source file format and file size are roughly indicated as follows:

| Sound source file format         | File size per minute | Total saveable time (for 80 MB) |
|----------------------------------|----------------------|---------------------------------|
| WAV (monaural, 48 kHz, 16 bit)   | 5.8 MB               | About 14 minutes                |
| WAV (monaural, 44.1 kHz, 16 bit) | 5.3 MB               | About 15 minutes                |
| WAV (monaural, 44.1 kHz, 8 bit)  | 2.6 MB               | About 30 minutes                |
| MP3 (monaural, 320 kbps)         | 2.4 MB               | About 33 minutes                |
| MP3 (monaural, 256 kbps)         | 1.9 MB               | About 42 minutes                |
| MP3 (monaural, 192 kbps)         | 1.4 MB               | About 56 minutes                |
| MP3 (monaural, 128 kbps)         | 1.0 MB               | About 83 minutes                |

Note that the above times are only provided as a guide. Total times may be shorter than those indicated, depending on the recording device or the data creation method.


**Step 1.** Click on the Upload icon  to the right of the media number to be saved.  
The file explorer opens.

**Step 2.** Select the sound source file to be uploaded to the unit.

**Step 3.** Click on the OK button.  
Upload begins.  
Following upload completion, the new sound source filename is added to the displayed Internal Sound Source list.

## 11.3. Downloading Sound Source Files

Follow the procedure below to download sound source files:

**Step 1.** Click on the Download icon  to the right of the media number to be saved to the PC.  
The file explorer opens.

**Step 2.** Select the folder where the file will be saved.

**Step 3.** Click on the OK button.


The selected sound source file is downloaded.

## 11.4. Deleting Sound Source Files

Follow the procedure below to delete sound source files:

### Note

If sound source files are deleted while an internal sound source broadcast is in progress, the broadcast will stop.

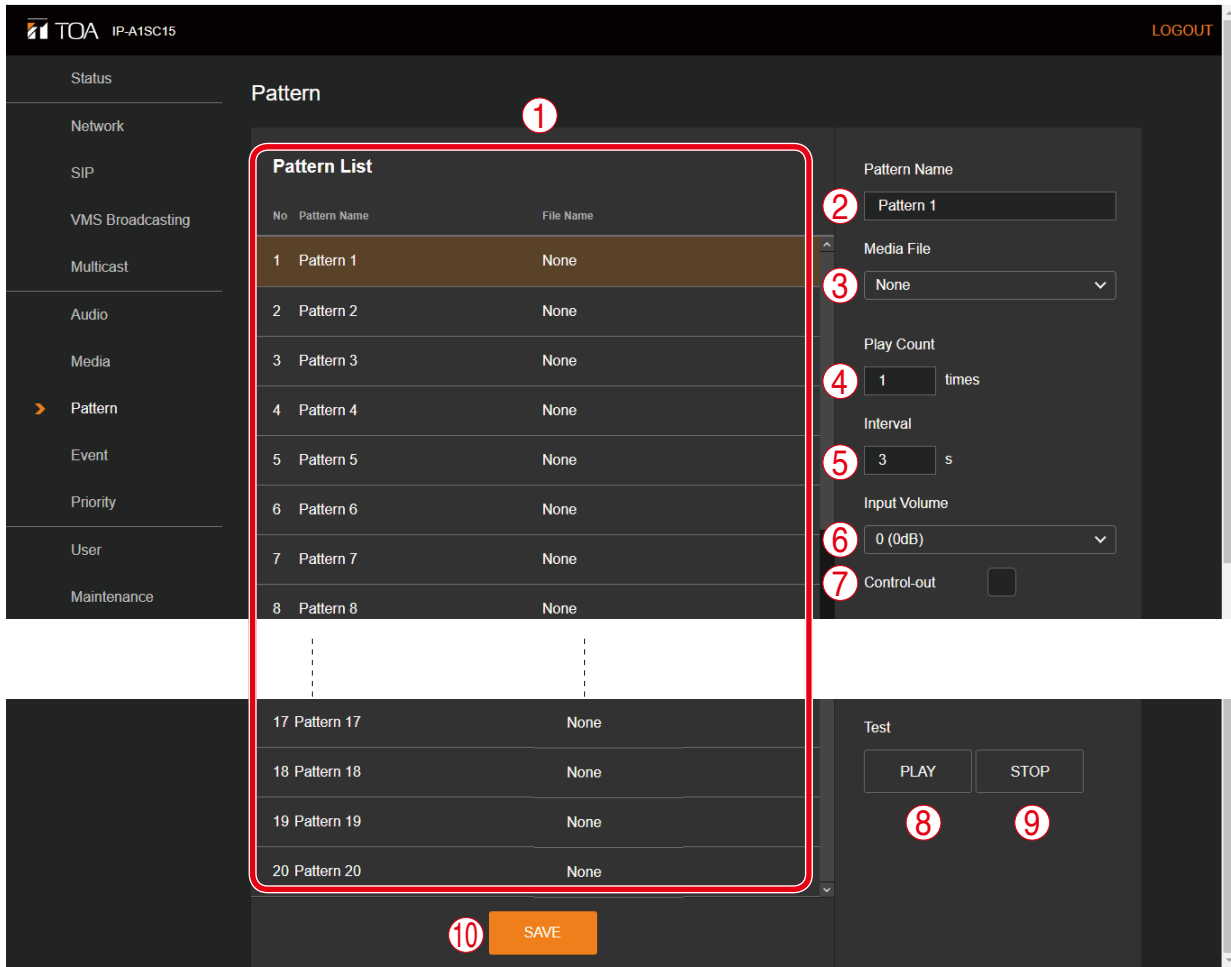
**Step 1.** Click on the Delete icon  to the right of the media number to be deleted.  
The dialog box is displayed.

**Step 2.** Click on the YES button.  
The selected sound source file is deleted.

## 12. PATTERN REGISTRATION SCREEN

Up to 20 internal sound source files can be registered as a broadcast pattern for broadcast in synchronization with specific events.

### 12.1. Display Contents



| Item   | Contents  |
|--|---|
| (1) Pattern List                                 | Up to 20 internal sound source files can be registered to each broadcast pattern. Clicking on a pattern activates it for the registration of sound source files, which can be selected on the right side of the screen.   |
| (2) Pattern Name                                 | Assigns a name to each pattern.<br><b>Tips</b><br><ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• For usable characters, please refer to "<a href="#">USABLE CHARACTERS</a>" on p. 48.</li> <li>• Max: 15 characters.</li> </ul> |
| (3) Media Files<br>(Internal sound source files) | Select the internal sound source files to be broadcast in each pattern.   |

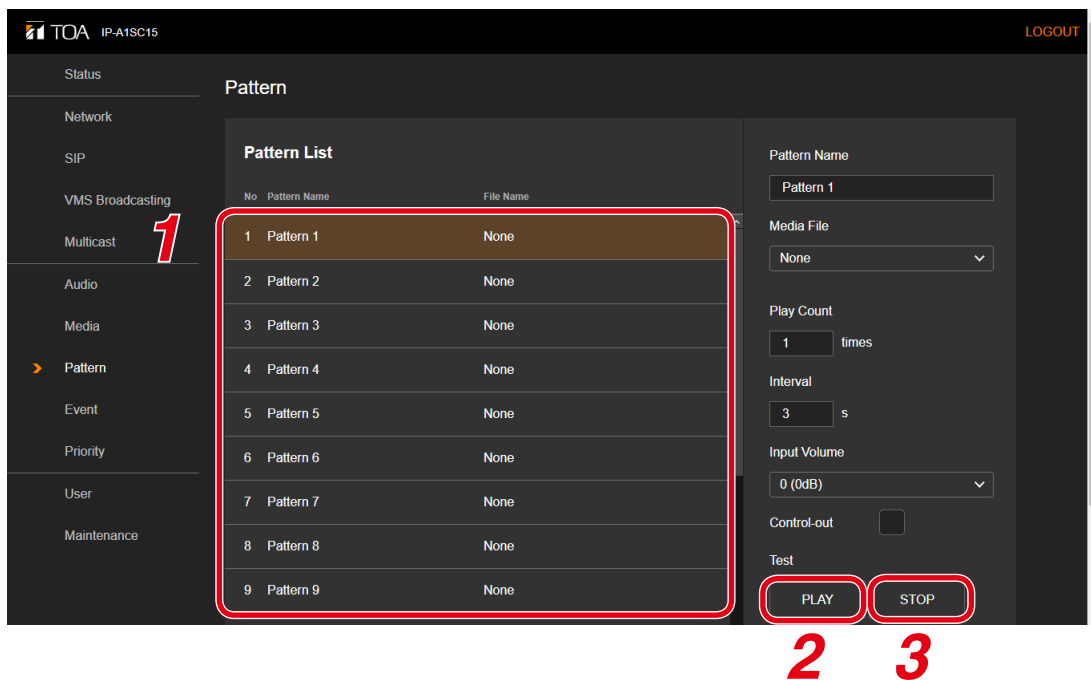

| (7)  | Control-out<br>(Control output button) | Connected external equipment can be controlled by transmitting a signal from the control output during broadcasts of internal sound source files.<br>If the checkbox at right is marked, the external control output turns ON when the unit begins broadcasting internal sound source files, and turns OFF when the broadcast is stopped. |
| (8)  | PLAY button                            | Click to start the test broadcast of a broadcast pattern. (Refer to the following section, Performing Broadcast Tests.)   |
| (9)  | STOP button                            | Click to stop the test broadcast of the broadcast pattern.<br>(Refer to the following section, Performing Broadcast Tests.)   |

## 12.2. Performing Broadcast Tests

Follow the procedure below to conduct broadcast tests for selected broadcast patterns:

### Note

Neither the PLAY nor STOP buttons can be used if the set contents have not yet been saved.



**Step 1.** Click and select the broadcast pattern to be tested.

**Step 2.** Click on the PLAY button.

A test broadcast of the selected broadcast pattern will begin.

**Step 3.** Click on the STOP button to stop the test.

The test broadcast stops.

### 12.3. Saving Settings & Changes

When all settings or changes are completed, save their contents.

**Step 1.** Click on the SAVE button.  
The dialog box is displayed.

**Step 2.** Click on the OK button.

**Note**

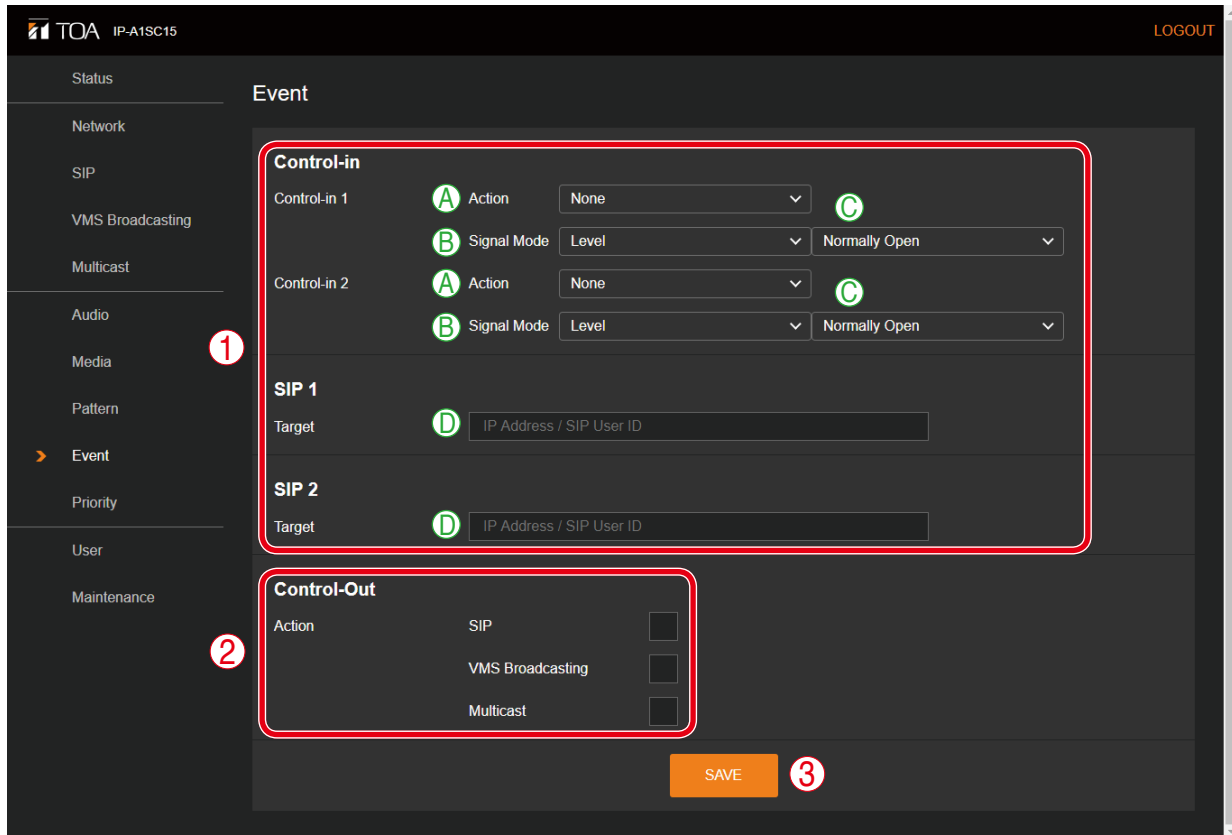
Settings and changes performed on this screen are enabled immediately after being saved. However, any changes to the offset volume settings are only reflected beginning with the next broadcast after they are saved.



## 13. EVENT SETTINGS SCREEN

Perform all settings related to contact control input and output.

### 13.1. Display Contents



#### (1) Control-in

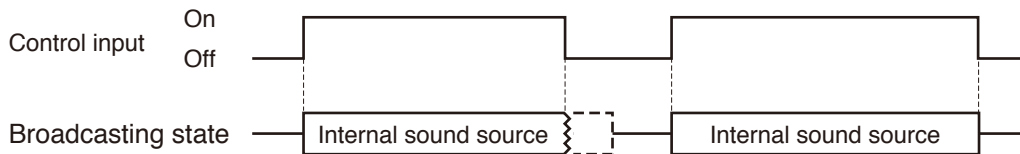
Broadcasts can be initiated by control signals received from connected external equipment. Each of the 2 control inputs can be independently assigned which broadcast to execute.

|   | Item        | Contents   |

| A | Action      | Click on the [∇] button to select the function to be executed when a signal is received at Control Input from an external device.<br>None: Disables Control Input 1 or 2.<br>Pattern 1 – 20: Broadcast the internal sound source file assigned to the pattern.<br>SIP1, SIP2: Make SIP calls to the destination terminals corresponding to the IP addresses or SIP user IDs set in the Target fields of SIP 1 and SIP 2 (D).   |
| B | Signal Mode | Click on the [∇] button to select the signal mode.<br>Level: Only executes the designated broadcast pattern for the period of time that input remains enabled, stopping the broadcast when input is terminated.<br>Edge: Executes the designated broadcast pattern when the input is enabled, and continues with the broadcast even after the input is terminated.<br><b>Note</b><br>If SIP1 or SIP2 is selected in Action (A), only the Edge signal mode can be selected. |

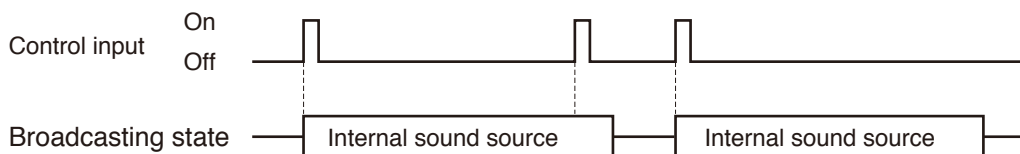

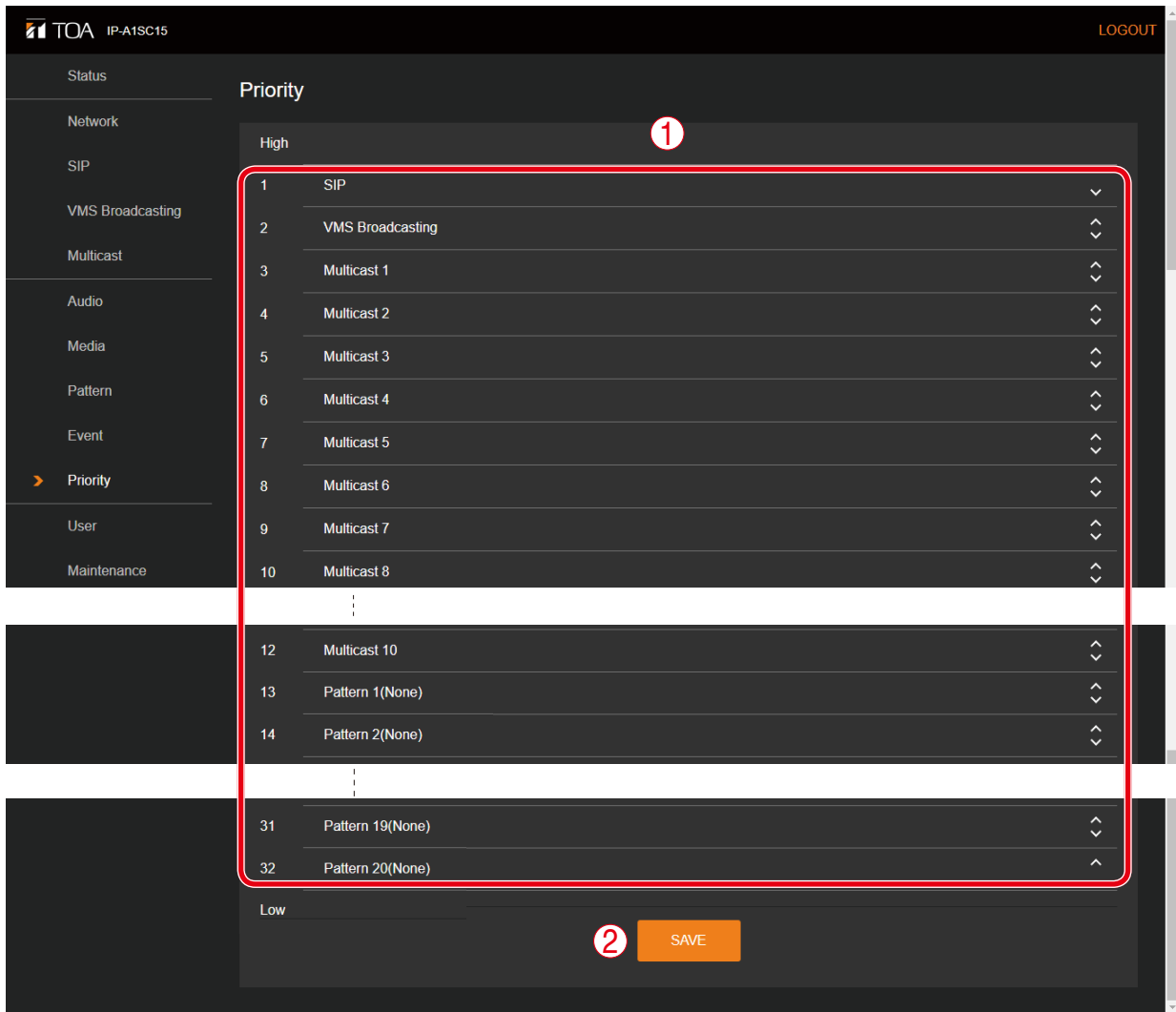

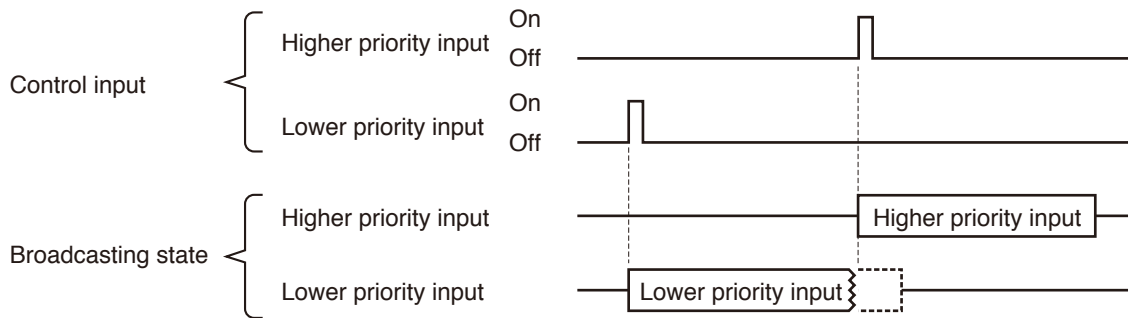

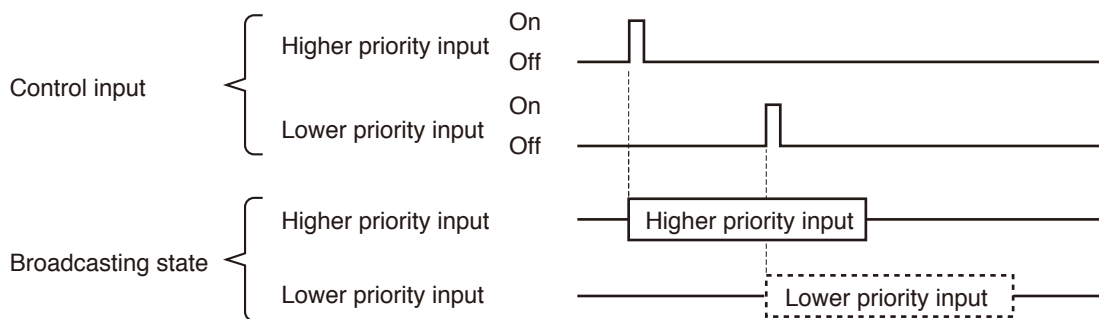

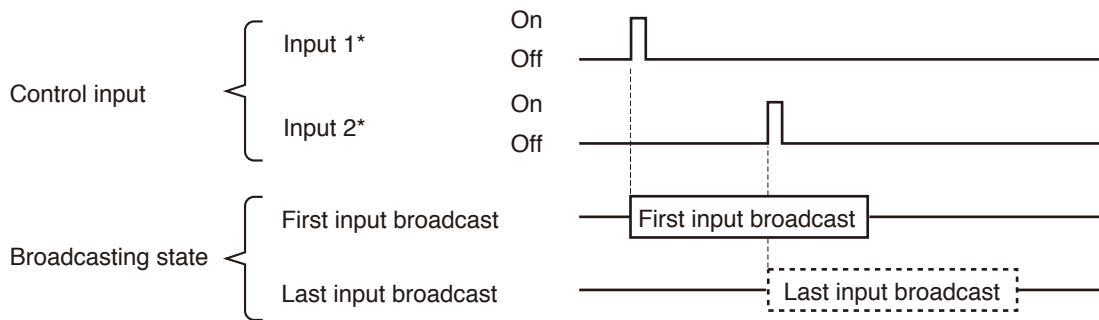

## 18. IP SETTING TOOL

The IP Setting Tool allows multiple units to be efficiently set up. It also makes it possible to save the unit's setting contents to the PC or upload to the unit settings contents stored on the PC. Using this function, the same settings can also be duplicated onto multiple units. Only use the IP Setting Tool while both the PC and the unit are connected to the same network. (See "CONNECTION" on p. 5.)

### 18.1. Before Using:

On the TOA DATA Library (<https://www.toa-products.com/international/>), perform a search for the product number "IP-A1SC15" and download the "IPSettingTool.exe" IP Setting Tool. The following shortcut icon appears on the desktop:

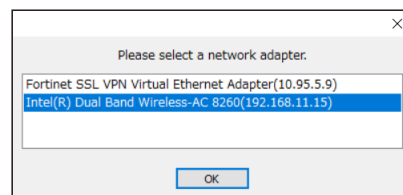

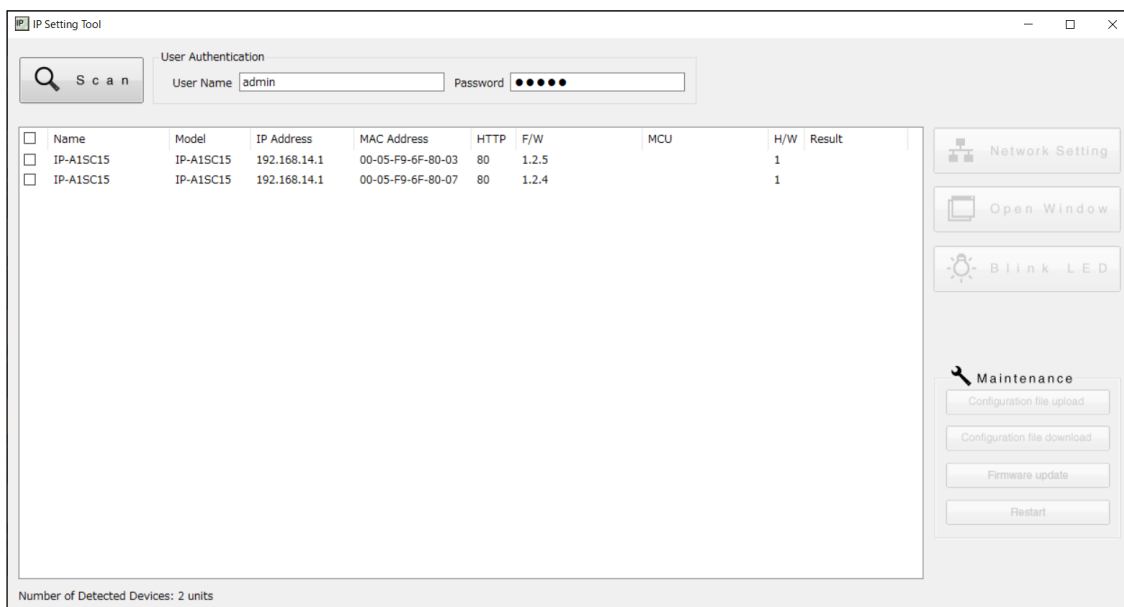

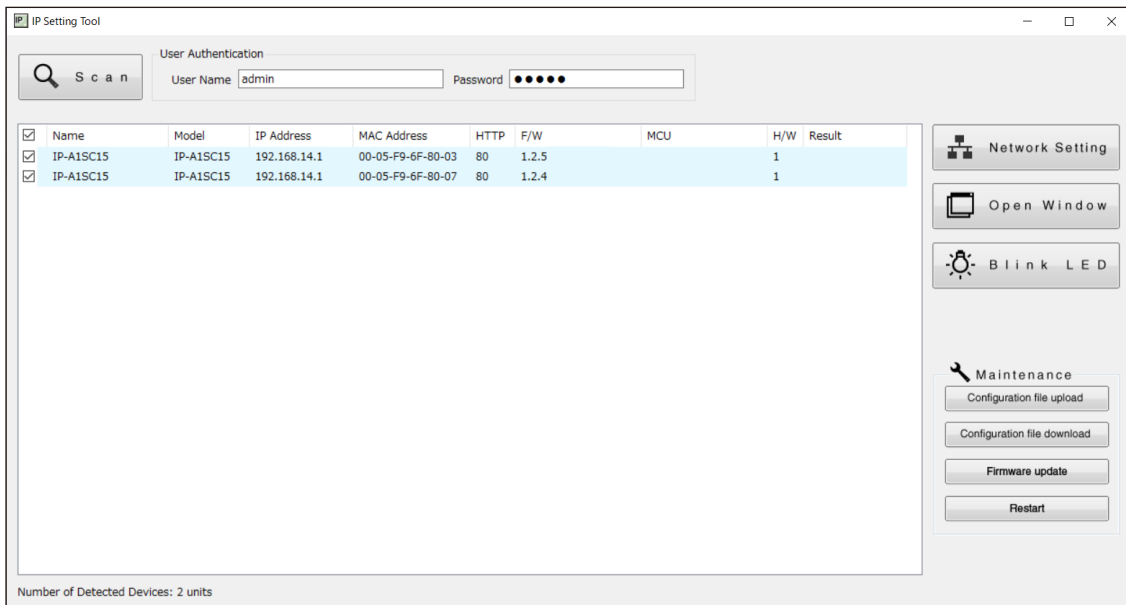
- When the PC has access to multiple network adapters, the confirmation screen as shown at right is displayed. Select the network adapter that can be connected to the unit and click on the OK button.

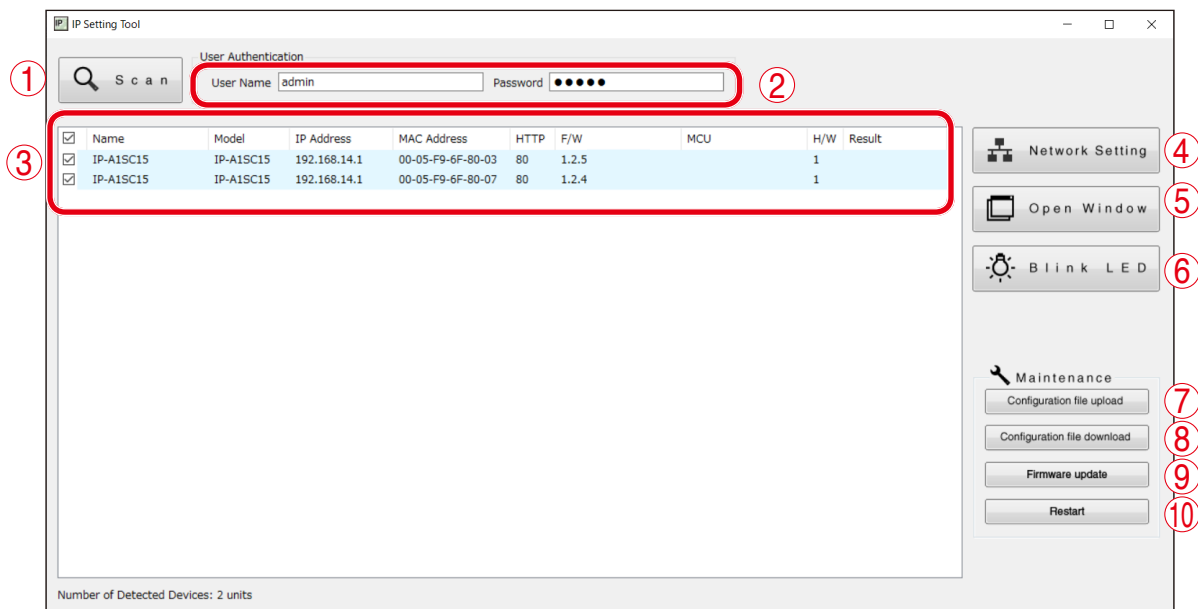

**(6) Blink LED button**

When clicked, the status indicator for the selected unit flashes 3 times.

**(7) Configuration file upload button**

Click on this button to upload the settings file to the unit from the PC. The same settings file can also be simultaneously uploaded to multiple units. For details, please refer to "[Uploading Settings Files](#)" on p. 44.

**(8) Configuration file download button**

Click on this button to download the settings file to the PC from the unit. The downloaded settings file can be used as the original file when uploading the same settings file to multiple units. For details, please refer to "[Downloading Settings Files](#)" on p. 45.

**(9) Firmware Update button**

Click on this button to update the unit's firmware. The same firmware update can also be simultaneously carried out on multiple units. For details, please refer to "[Firmware Update](#)" on p. 46.

**(10) Restart button**

Click on this button to restart the unit(s).
